The Committee also agreed that the online version of the minutes of the meeting held on 13th January 2009 should be redacted so as to blank out the name of a resident of Tower Hamlets.

2. MATTERS ARISING

(a) Item 2(e) – Airport Policing

The Committee noted that the *Policing and Crime Bill* completed its Commons stages at the end of May and was now in committee in the House of Lords.

(b) Item 6 – Fleet Changes

Gary Hodgetts said the data collected during the visit by the Emb190SR in March 2009 for trials was still being evaluated by the CAA. There was nothing further to report at this stage.

(c) Item 12 – EU Environmental Noise Directive (END) - Proposed changes to English Regulations

Following the last meeting of the Committee the Secretary had written to Defra to inform them of the Committee's comments on the proposed changes to the *Environmental Noise (England) Regulations 2006*. Defra had recently published a summary of responses to the consultation. This could be seen this on the Defra website ²

(d) Item 15 – Olympic Route Network (ORN) - Consultation

At its last meeting the Committee had endorsed the comments submitted by the Secretary in relation to the Department for Transport's plans for an Olympic Road Network. On 30th June the Secretary sent to all members a copy of the Department's letter of response. The text of the Order, maps indicating the ORN routes, a report on the consultation responses and the Government's response to the issues raised could all be seen on the Department's website³. Starting this summer the *Olympic Delivery Authority (ODA)* planned to engage and consult with residents, businesses and other stakeholders on the design, implementation and operation of the traffic management measures to be applied on the ORN roads during the Games.

3. COMMITTEE MEMBERSHIP

(a) Renewal of the Committee

The Committee noted that Secretary would shortly be asking participating organisations to nominate a representative(s) to serve as a member of the Consultative Committee for the three years ending October 2012. As previously agreed the nominations received recently from the *West Thamesmead Residents Forum* and *Tower Hamlets Local Area Partnership 7*, the *London Development Agency* and the *Guild of Travel Management Companies* would be treated as being made in respect the new Committee. Likewise the latest appointments made by the London Boroughs of Greenwich (Cllr Denies Hyland) , Bexley (Cllr Peter Craske) and Barking and Dagenham (Tim Martin) were all very recent and it was not proposed to ask these Council's to submit new nominations. It was noted that local authorities have the option of making their appointments on an annual basis if they choose.

(b) Community Representatives - Newham

The procedure for choosing the representatives of the communities living near the Airport in Newham had been circulated to members with the Agenda together with a copy of the application form and the person specification. These documents had been drawn up by the Airport in line with the discussion at the last meeting and in consultation with the officers of the Committee.

The recruitment process was now under way. Local advertising (including *Runway News*, the *Newham Mag* and the *Newham Recorder*) was complete and the Airport had also written with full information to the nine Newham councillors representing the wards concerned and this information had also been posted on the Airport's website and that of the Committee⁴. It remained to write to a number of local organisations - including the *Area Tenants Liaison Committee (South A13 Area)* and the *Newham Voluntary Agencies Council* - and this would be completed in the next few days. The closing date of applications was 31st July 2009 at which point it might be necessary for some members to help in the selection process. A number of applications had already been received.

(c) Representatives of Airport Users

The Committee agreed that that henceforth the following bodies should be invited to send representatives to serve as members of the Consultative Committee:

- *The Airline Operators Committee* x 2
- *London Chamber of Commerce and Industry* x 1
- *Guild of Travel Management Companies* x 1
- *Docklands Business Club* x 1
- *Canary Wharf Limited* x 1

These bodies would thus be invited to make nominations in connection with the renewal of the Committee already discussed – see Item 3(a) above. It was agreed to delay an invitation to *Which?* while the Airport considered the possibility that a passenger representative might be secured by advertising in a similar manner to that adopted at Heathrow and Gatwick. The matter would be considered again at the next meeting. The new list of Airport users would need to be taken into account in revising the Committee’s constitution – see Item 9 below.

(d) Deputy Chairman – Vacancy

The Airport would make a recommendation to the next meeting.

(e) Gallions Housing Association

The Committee noted that Sundeep Pawar had left the Gallions Housing Association and was no longer a member of the Consultative Committee. A successor would be sought as part of the forthcoming renewal of the Committee for the three years ending October 2012. The Secretary had written to Sundeep expressing the Committee’s appreciation of his work as a member of the Committee

4. CORRESPONDENCE

The Committee noted without comment the correspondence with Jacqueline Price and with a resident of Tower Hamlets who wished to remain anonymous. Members had earlier that week received copies of questions raised with Adisa Akintola by a resident of West Thamesmead. The Airport would be sending a reply. Copies would be sent to members of the Committee.

5. AIRPORT DIRECTOR’S REPORT

The Airport’s report was tabled by Gary Hodgetts. In relation to the change in the Runway designations it was noted that this involved an enormous amount of work which had to be completed in a short time. Similar action had been taken at the same time by Stansted Airport. The Secretary noted that for the same reason the runway designations at Heathrow and Gatwick had been changed a number of years ago.

6. COMMUNITY REPORT

The Airport’s report was tabled by Elizabeth Hegarty. A copy of the report is appended to these minutes.

A number of members commented on the success of Fun Day which had attracted about 26,000 people. Dennis James said that there was more for young people to do. On the DLR’s stand there had been fewer “freebies” but there had been much more interest in the literature available there. In response to a question the Airport noted that the income was still being counted but it was already clear that the amount to be donated to the Richard House Hospice would exceed £35,000.

Appreciation was also expressed of the Airport’s work experience programme.

7. STANDING ITEM ON ENVIRONMENTAL ISSUES

The Airport’s report was tabled by Gary Hodgetts. A copy of the report is appended to these minutes.

8. PLANNING APPLICATION

On 30th June the Secretary had informed members that at it’s meeting the following evening (8th July) the London Borough of Newham’s Development Control Committee would once again consider the planning application submitted by the Airport in August 2007. The Agenda for the

meeting, and the report submitted by the Council's officers, could be seen on the Council's website⁵. The Secretary would inform members of the outcome of the meeting

9. COMMITTEE CONSTITUTION

The Agenda report was noted. A new draft of the constitution was being prepared. As the draft was developed it would be circulated to members for comment. There would be an opportunity for discussion at a future meeting. Timing would depend to some degree on the DfT's planned discussion paper on the possible revisions to the Department's *Guidelines* on consultative committees.

10. SLOT ALLOCATION REGULATIONS – CONSULTATION ON DESIGNATION OF LONDON CITY AIRPORT AT LEVEL 3

The Committee concurred in the further response which had been sent by the Secretary in consultation with the Chairman. This noted that the Committee continued to support the proposal that LCY should be designated as "coordinated" (Level 3) for the purposes of the slot allocation regulations, not least because it will help to ensure any new limit on the number of flights which might be approved by the London Borough of Newham in response to the planning application submitted by the Airport early in August 2007. However, the Committee recognised that the latest figures do not support the designation of the Airport at Level 3 at this stage and accordingly a delay in the introduction of the measure seemed to be necessary and justified. Against this background the designation of the Airport at Level 2 seemed to be the right answer for the time being.

11. NOISE ACTION PLAN

The sub-group (comprising Howard Sheppard, Glynis Webb, Sid Keys and Dennis James) had met with the Airport and their noise consultants (Bickerdike Allen Partners) on 18 June 2009. The Committee's Secretary was also present. The meeting considered a first draft of the plan prepared by BAP. Members of the sub-group commented on the draft in detail noting in particular:

- a) that the plan would require the drawing up of an enhanced scheme of noise monitoring and mitigation – the noise monitoring issue had started to acquire more importance in recent times.
- b) that as properties fell within the 57 LAeq noise contour – whether within Newham or in the adjoining Boroughs - they would continue to be assessed and if eligible offered sound insulation and mechanical ventilation. The insulation of such properties would be inspected every 10 years to ensure that the work undertaken continued to meet the required standard of noise insulation.
- c) The blast screen to protect those living in Camel Road would be reviewed to see if any improvements could be made to enhance the noise attenuation properties of the screen
- d) that those living within the 66LAeq noise contour would attract an enhanced level of sound insulation.
- e) that the Airport would offer to purchase any property which fell within the 69 LAeq noise contour – there were no such properties at present.
- f) that if it was to be used for consultation purposes the draft would need a measure of reformatting and simplification.

The minutes of the meeting of the sub-group would be circulated to members.

It was clear that the revised noise regime owed much to the discussions with the London Borough of Newham in relation to the s106 Agreement proposed in connection with the Council's consideration of the Airport's interim planning application. Indeed, the Airport was understandably keen to ensure that the timing of the Noise Action Plan fitted in with that for the planning application.

The draft plan was now being prepared for use in connection with the required public consultation lasting 16 weeks. The Secretary was gathering information on the steps being taken by other airports to publicise the draft plan and invite comments. This information would be considered by the Airport in deciding how best to make local people aware of the draft plan for London City.

12. PLANNING APPLICATIONS – NOTIFICATION/CONSULTATION WITH LOCAL RESIDENTS

The Committee noted the reply received from the *Department for Communities and Local Government (DCLG)*. This had been considered by the UKACCs Annual meeting on 27/28 May in Belfast. That meeting had felt the response was inadequate and agreed that a joint approach should now be made to the *Local Government Association* and the *Association of London Government* with a view to a clearer and more positive outcome. The UKACCs Secretariat had thus written to both these bodies and copies of their letters were sent to members of this Committee on 5th June. As soon as both had responded copies of their replies would be circulated to members.

At the UKACCs meeting it had been suggested that it might be helpful to other Airport Consultative Committees to consider the arrangements in place at Gatwick Airport where the nine local authorities around the airport had entered into a *Memorandum of Understanding* which included common arrangements on the way in which planning applications and their publicity would be dealt with. A copy of the Memorandum was being obtained and would be circulated to the Committee.

13. REFORMING THE FRAMEWORK FOR THE ECONOMIC REGULATION OF UK AIRPORTS - CONSULTATION

The Committee endorsed the further response which had been sent to the Department on 5th June 2009. This reiterated that the Committee had reservations about the proposal that at national level *Passenger Focus* should henceforth represent air passengers instead of the *Air Transport Users Committee (AUC)* and went on to say that although the Committee had not had an opportunity to discuss the UKACCs alternative it seemed very likely that those proposals would find favour with the Committee when it looked again at the matter at this meeting.

Subsequently both *Passenger Focus* and the *AUC* had sent copies of their responses to the DfT consultation – copies of these submissions could be obtained from the Secretary.

14. UK AIRPORT CONSULTATIVE COMMITTEES - ANNUAL LIAISON MEETING – BELFAST CITY AIRPORT – 27/28 MAY 2009

The Secretary had circulated a note of this meeting which had been prepared for another Consultative Committee. The official note of the meeting was being prepared and would be circulated, and placed on the UKACCs website⁶, as soon as it was ready. Meanwhile the papers considered at the meeting, and the presentations received by members, had already been posted on that website.

15. ANY OTHER BUSINESS

Committee Awayday

A number of members had written to express their appreciation of the arrangements made for this year's Awayday not least because the event afforded members the opportunity to get to know one another better. These annual visits were also valuable in that they allowed members to experience first-hand the LCY product and so allow them to make more informed judgments about the Airport and related issues.

1. Airport Passenger Traffic

During April, May and June we have seen passenger numbers decline by 17.8% compared with the same period in 2008. Average aircraft size has increased slightly from 71 to 73 seats with average load factor also increasing slightly from 55% to 56%.

Over the same period the Jet Centre traffic has also declined by 26% (35% last quarter) in passengers and 23% (33% last quarter) in aircraft movements. It is noted that the rate of decline in this type of traffic has reduced considerably.

2. Route Changes

The Manchester route ceased operating in May primarily due to the improved competition provided by very frequent, publically subsidised rail services. This trend is in line with that occurring at other London airports and has been forecast for some time.

SAS withdrew their Stockholm service at the end of June due to weakening demand and higher operating costs.

Despite the current economic climate, plans for the British Airways New York service are continuing. British Airways recently announced that the first transatlantic flight from LCA would take place on 29th September 2009 on the Airbus A318. From mid October two return flights will operate.

Entitled Club World London City, the new service will be given the airline's most prestigious flight number, BA001, previously used by Concorde.

The specially configured flat bed 32-seat aircraft will depart London City Airport and make a brief refueling stop at Shannon where passengers will disembark and clear US immigration. After the stopover, the direct flight from Shannon will go directly to domestic arrivals at New York JFK airport.

Flights from New York JFK will be a direct sleeper service.

Flight schedule:

BA001 departs LCY at 1240 and arrives JFK at 1705

BA002 departs JFK at 1830 and arrives at LCY at 0705 the following day

BA003 departs LCY at 1600 and arrives at JFK at 2025

BA004 departs JFK at 2150 and arrives at LCY at 1025 the following day

Weekend leisure fares start at £1,901.10 return with business fares starting at £4,912.10, rising to £5,625.10 for fully flexible.

3. Airport Developments

The Airport is not currently implementing any major development projects until it sees signs of an end to the current economic downturn. Along with other businesses this scaling back of capital expenditure is considered prudent financial behaviour.

4. Planning Application

As previously reported, the Airport's planning application to increase movement levels at the airport to 120,000 per year was approved by the Development Control Committee of the London Borough of Newham in October 2008. The Borough Planning Officer was authorised to grant planning permission subject to negotiation and completion of the s106 agreement. The negotiation of the s106 agreement is in its final stages. However, following the committee's decision, late representations were received from Friends of the Earth and the Council has confirmed that it will refer these back to the Development Control Committee scheduled for 8th July (tomorrow).

5. BA damaged aeroplane

The insurers decided to write-off the BA aircraft damaged in the incident on 13 February. The aircraft was screened and dismantled and removed by road.

6. Runway Designation

London City Airport's runway designators '28' and '10' are the abbreviated magnetic runway headings of 280° and 100°. These headings are used to identify the direction in which the runway was being used.

As the earth slowly orbits in a circular path, the direction from a fixed object, like the airport's runway, to magnetic north is constantly moving.

The direction of magnetic north decreases by approximately eight minutes of a degree every 12 months, therefore every seven and a half years it is altered by one degree. The amount of annual change depends on where in the world the fixed object is located.

In the UK, there is a directional change moving west which causes the runway heading to decrease. This means that the magnetic heading of the airport's runway has moved by almost 10° since being established in 1987. Consequently on 2 July London City Airport's runway designation was changed to 270° and 090°, abbreviated as '27' and '09'.

A team of staff and contractors worked throughout the night to change the airport's signage and paint markings. In addition a comprehensive document change took place, whereby all official charts and reference material were amended to reflect the change.

It may be at least 50 years before the runway designation needs to change again at London City Airport.

7. Air Quality – Terminal

Members will be aware that member of the GMB complained about the air quality in the terminal. The Health and Safety Executive has visited London City Airport and gathered all the information that they require. We expect that they will publish a report of their findings in due course.

8. Award for Staff Development and Training

London City Airport received the winner award for Dedication to Staff Development and Training at the Docklands Business Club Awards. The award was presented at a gala event on 25 June. We believe this award acknowledges London City Airport's commitment to its staff through significant investment in developmental training. The airport has long been a champion of promoting career advancement for local people, encouraging personal development, and investing in training programmes that enable staff to enjoy good long term careers at the airport.

Over £165,000 was invested during 2008 for employee personal development training, available to all staff at London City Airport.

9. ID Cards

The new Home Secretary announced on 30th June that the introduction of identity cards for all British citizens would now be voluntary and accordingly he had decided that identity cards issued to airside workers, planned initially at Manchester and London City airports later this year, should also be voluntary.

- Students from Newham College studying diplomas conducted two-week work placements in Engineering and ICT with the relevant Airport Departments.
- The full engineering diploma group from Newham College attended London City Airport during June for a specially designed engineering workshop. The workshop was delivered by the airport engineering and health and safety teams, who provided presentations, training, demonstrations and a highly sought-after visit to the airport's main plant room.
- Elizabeth recently attended a workshop delivered by Greenwich Council regarding the delivery of the new diplomas in the London Borough of Greenwich. LCA will be contributing to the relevant diplomas in the future through the provision of work experience, case studies, guest speakers and airport visits.
